	הִיהָ hebrew The word הִיהָ means “to exist” or “to be” or “to become” or “to come into being” and occurs 3561 times in the Old Testament. This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence.
Hebrew	* It is used in the creation narrative of Genesis 1, represented by the English words Genesis 1:3Exodus 3:12Ruth 1:1Isaiah 2:2 הָיָה עוֹרֵר אֶת הָיָה hebrew The Hebrew הָיָה word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence. For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by וַיִּבְרָא אֱלֹהִים (הָיָה) עַל שְׁלֹשׁ מֵאוֹת הֶלֶל וְלֹא יָלוּ שֵׁם בְּשִׁלּוּשָׁה
ESV	Now Abishai, the brother of Joab, was chief of the thirty. And he wielded his spear against 300 men and killed them and won a name beside the three.
NIV	Abishai the brother of Joab was chief of the Thirty. He raised his spear against three hundred men, whom he killed, and so he became as famous as the Three.
NLT	Abishai, the brother of Joab, was the leader of the Thirty. He once used his spear to kill 300 enemy warriors in a single battle. It was by such feats that he became as famous as the Three.
