Hebrew	The word הָיָה means “to exist” or “to be” or “to become” or “to come into being” and occurs 3561 times in the Old Testament. This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence. * It is used in the creation narrative of Genesis 1, represented by the English words Genesis 1:3Exodus 3:12Ruth 1:1Isaiah 2:2 לוֹ בִּירוּשָׁלַם שְׁמוֹעַ וְשׁוּבָב נָתָן וְשִׁלְמֹה
ESV	These are the names of the children born to him in Jerusalem: Shammua, Shobab, Nathan, Solomon,
NIV	These are the names of the children born to him there: Shammua, Shobab, Nathan, Solomon,
NLT	These are the names of David's sons who were born in Jerusalem: Shammua, Shobab, Nathan, Solomon,

LXX	καὶplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigκαί greek Meaning * And * Also * Both * Even * Too * So Is a conjunction that connects single words or terms or sentences. IT is most frequently translated as “and” ταῦταplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigοὗτος / αὕτη / τοῦτο greek Meaning: * These or this * This one, this person, this thing * They or he or she or it Demonstrative pronoun. οὗτος usually refers to something close to the speaker — “this” as opposed to ἐκεῖνος (John 9:161 John 5:111 Corinthians 15:501 John 4:9John 5:1Matthew 3:17John 7:26Luke 22:19 τὰplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigὁ greek The definite article ὀνόματα αὐτῶνplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigαὐτός greek Meaning * He, she, it * Himself, herself, itself * Same Personal pronoun (reflexive). Core uses Function English Equivalent Typical Translation Example (Greek) Example (English) τῶνplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigὁ greek The definite article τεχθέντων οἱ ἦσανplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigεἰμί greek εἰμί is the first person singular verb for “to be” (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = “to be”). It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἰμί is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g. αὐτῷplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigαὐτός greek Meaning * He, she, it * Himself, herself, itself * Same Personal pronoun (reflexive). 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KJV	Now these are the names of his children which he had in Jerusalem; Shammua, and Shobab, Nathan, and Solomon,
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
