It is a word that is used very frequently in the New Testament, and is often unexpressed and not translated in English, νοῦς μου ἄκαρπός ἐστιν, plugin-autotooltip default plugin-autotooltip bigεἰμί greek εἰμί is the first person singular verb for "to be" (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = "to be"). It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἰμί is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g. **ESV** For if I pray in a tongue, my spirit prays but my mind is unfruitful. NIV For if I pray in a tongue, my spirit prays, but my mind is unfruitful. **NLT** For if I pray in tongues, my spirit is praying, but I don't understand what I am saying. KIV For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prayeth, but my understanding is unfruitful.
