δέ is a conjunction that can mean “but” or “and” or “also” or “moreover”. It is a word that is used very frequently in the New Testament, and is often unexpressed and not translated in English.

Preposition that relates to movement through space, time, means or cause - it's a preposition of movement and mediation.

When used with the genitive case, διὰ emphasizes the means or channel by which something happens. John 1:3 Matthew 24:12 John 1:32 Timothy 2:10 Romans 5:1 John 1:17 τῶν

Preposition meaning “in”. πνεύματι ἀγίῳ ἀποσταλέντι ἀπ’ οὐρανοῦ, οὐρανός

Meaning:

\* The sky \* Air \* Heaven or heavens

278 occurrences in the New Testament.

Οὐρανός is used in Scripture to describe the sky and universe (that is, the visible expanse above the earth) as well as the transcendent realm where God is present. For example, in Matthew 6:26 Matthew 24:29 Matthew 6:9 εἰς ἃ ἐπιθυμοῦσιν ἄγγελοι παρακύψαι.

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
