Hebrew	הִיָּהּ plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big hebrew The word הִיָּהּ means “to exist” or “to be” or “to become” or “to come into being” and occurs 3561 times in the Old Testament. This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence.
Hebrew	* It is used in the creation narrative of Genesis 1, represented by the English words Genesis 1:3Exodus 3:12Ruth 1:1Isaiah 2:2 אֶת בְּשׁוּב דָּוִד מֵהַכּוֹת אֶת plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big hebrew The Hebrew אֶת word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence. For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by הָיָה אֱלֹהִים (הַפִּלְשֹׁתִי וְתִצְאָנָה הַנָּשִׁים מִכָּל עָרֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל לְשׁוֹר לְשִׁיר וְהַמַּחֲלוֹת לִקְרֹאת שָׁאוּל הַמֶּלֶךְ בַּתָּפִים בְּשִׂמְחָה וּבְשִׁלְשִׁים
ESV	As they were coming home, when David returned from striking down the Philistine, the women came out of all the cities of Israel, singing and dancing, to meet King Saul, with tambourines, with songs of joy, and with musical instruments.
NIV	When the men were returning home after David had killed the Philistine, the women came out from all the towns of Israel to meet King Saul with singing and dancing, with joyful songs and with tambourines and lutes.
NLT	When the victorious Israelite army was returning home after David had killed the Philistine, women from all the towns of Israel came out to meet King Saul. They sang and danced for joy with tambourines and cymbals.
