εἰμί is the first person singular verb for “to be” (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = “to be”).

Is a conjunction that connects single words or terms or sentences. IT is most frequently translated as “and” οὐκ ἔστιν plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigεἰμί
