

אתָּ plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big

The Hebrew אתָּ word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence.

For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by וַיֵּאמְרוּ שְׁלֹחַ אֶת (כָּל סִרְיֵי פְּלִשְׁתִּים) plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big

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Meanings:

* God * god * goddess * divine ones * angels

Noun, masculine יֵשׁוּעַ לְיִשְׂרָאֵל וְיֵשׁוּעַ לְמִקְדָּשׁ וְלֹא יָמִית אֶתִּי plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big

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The word הָיָה means “to exist” or “to be” or “to become” or “to come into being” and occurs 3561 times in the Old Testament.

This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence.
