The Hebrew אֵת word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence.

For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by בָּרָא אֱלֹחֵים ( כָּל הַמִּדְבֵּר הַגָּדוֹל ゚וְהַנּוֹּלָא הֲשֶׁר אֲשֶׁר אֲשֶׁר אֲשֶׁר אֲהָה ( כָּל הַמִּדְבֵּר הַגָּדוֹל ゚וְהַנּוֹלָי בְּאֲשֵׁר אֲהָה יָהוָה plugin-autotooltip \_ default plugin-autotooltip bigair.

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Meaning

\* Yahweh - God's personal name

It is not a generic term for "god", but rather the word יְהוָה (YHWH) is the name by which God uniquely identifies himself in the Old Testament.
