## Meaning

\* Yahweh - God's personal name

lt is not a generic term for "god", but rather the word אים (YHWH) is the name by which God uniquely identifies himself in the Old Testament.

The Hebrew אַת word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence.

For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by בַּרָא אֱלֹהָים ( מִפְנֵידְּ

for whoever does these things is an abomination to the LORD. And because of these abominations the LORD your God is driving them **ESV** out before you.

εἰμί is the first person singular verb for "to be" (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = "to be").

lt an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἰμί is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g. γὰρ βδέλυγμα κυρίω τῷplugin-autotooltip\_default plugin-autotooltip\_bigò

Usage in the New Testament

The sense of  $\pi \tilde{\alpha} \zeta$  depends on whether it modifies a singular or plural noun, and whether that noun is countable or uncountable.
