<p>Hebrew</p>	<p>הָיָה פּלוּגִין-אוֹטוֹטוּלִיפּ_דֵפּוּלְט פּלוּגִין-אוֹטוֹטוּלִיפּ_בִּיג hebrew The word הָיָה means “to exist” or “to be” or “to become” or “to come into being” and occurs 3561 times in the Old Testament. This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence. * It is used in the creation narrative of Genesis 1, represented by the English words Genesis 1:3Exodus 3:12Ruth 1:1Isaiah 2:2 לִפְרֹעָה וְהָיָה יְהוָה יוֹצֵאֵנוּ מֵאֶרֶץ מִצְרָיִםפּלוּגִין-אוֹטוֹטוּלִיפּ_דֵפּוּלְט פּלוּגִין-אוֹטוֹטוּלִיפּ_בִּיג hebrew Meaning * Yahweh - God's personal name It is not a generic term for “god”, but rather the word יְהוָה (YHWH) is the name by which God uniquely identifies himself in the Old Testament.
