ESV	The words of a wise man's mouth win him favor, but the lips of a fool consume him.
NIV	Words from a wise man's mouth are gracious, but a fool is consumed by his own lips.
NLT	Wise words bring approval, but fools are destroyed by their own words.

	* A word or words * Statement * Message * Speech * Account * Used in John to mean God the Son
	Masculine noun. Related to the verb λέγω.
	λόγος in Greek Thought
LXX	Before the New Testament, λόγος already had deep philosophical use. In Greek philosophy, λόγος was the rational principle that ordered the universe, the divine reason that structured all things. In Heraclitus, λόγος referred to the unifying rational principle behind the constant change in the world.... στόματος σοφοῦ χάρις καὶplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigαὐτός

	* And * Also * Both * Even * Too * So
	Is a conjunction that connects single words or terms or sentences. IT is most frequently translated as “and” χείλη ἄφρονος καταποντιοῦσιν αὐτόνplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigαὐτός
LXX	greek
	Meaning
	* He, she, it * Himself, herself, itself * Same
	Personal pronoun (reflexive). Occurs more than 5,000 times in the New Testament.
