	<p>יהי <span>plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big</span>יהי</p> <p>hebrew</p> <p>The word יהי means “to exist” or “to be” or “to become” or “to come into being” and occurs 3561 times in the Old Testament.</p> <p>This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence.</p> <p>* It is used in the creation narrative of Genesis 1, represented by the English words Genesis 1:3Exodus 3:12Ruth 1:1Isaiah 2:2 יהי הוציא יהי היום היום <span>plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big</span>יהי</p> <p>hebrew</p> <p>Meaning</p> <p>* Yahweh - God's personal name</p> <p>It is not a generic term for “god”, but rather the word יהוה (YHWH) is the name by which God uniquely identifies himself in the Old Testament.</p>
Hebrew	<p>First appearing in Genesis 2:4, it occurs over 6,000 times in the Old Testament.Exodus 3:14Deuteronomy 6:4Psalm 23:1Romans 10:13Joel 2:32Exodus 20:7Psalm 18:1Exodus 15:3Psalm 8:1Genesis 2:41 Samuel 1:3Judges 6:24Genesis 22:14Jeremiah 23:6 את <span>plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big</span>את</p> <p>hebrew</p> <p>The Hebrew את word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence. It only ever occurs in conjunction with nouns associated with the definite article ה.Genesis 1:1 בני ישראל מארץ <span>plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big</span>ארץ</p> <p>hebrew</p> <p>Meaning:</p> <p>* Earth (e.g. Genesis 1:1) or world * Land * Countries or country</p> <p>The word ארץ can designate the whole of planet earth, or the inhabitable world or the national territory or ground.</p> <p>When coupled with heavens (שמים), the phrase indicates the entire created order.Genesis 12:1 מצרים על צבאתם</p>
ESV	And on that very day the LORD brought the people of Israel out of the land of Egypt by their hosts.
NIV	And on that very day the LORD brought the Israelites out of Egypt by their divisions.
NLT	On that very day the LORD brought the people of Israel out of the land of Egypt like an army.

LXX	<p><a href="#">καὶ</a>plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigκαί</p> <p>greek</p> <p>Meaning</p> <p>* And * Also * Both * Even * Too * So</p> <p>Is a conjunction that connects single words or terms or sentences. Connected to the English words “ground”, “geometry” and “geology”.</p> <p>It occurs throughout the LXX and the New Testament (approximately 250 times in the New Testament) and its meaning varies subtly on context, for example, in the LXX:Genesis 1:1Genesis 2:7Genesis 12:1 <a href="#">Αἰγύπτου σὺν δυνάμει αὐτῶν</a>plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigαὐτός</p> <p>greek</p> <p>Meaning</p> <p>* He, she, it * Himself, herself, itself * Same</p> <p>Personal pronoun (reflexive).
