In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence. It only ever occurs in conjunction with nouns associated with the definite article הַ. Genesis 1:1 הַיְהוָה אֱלֹהֵינוּ יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_big הַיְהוָה hebrew Meaning * Yahweh - God's personal name It is not a generic term for “god”, but rather the word הַיְהוָה (YHWH) is the name by which God uniquely identifies himself in the Old Testament. First appearing in Genesis 2:4, it occurs over 6,000 times in the Old Testament.
