For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by בְּרֵא אֱלֹהֵים ( אֱלֹהֶים plugin-autotooltip\_default plugin-autotooltip big אֱלֹהִים

Masculine noun. The word is dual in form (ending in יָם-) which normally indicates two things (like eyes and hands), however, however it functions as a plural. Deuteronomy 10:14 states that Genesis 1:20Psalm 115:3 ארץ

hebrew

Meaning:

\* Earth (e.g. Genesis 1:1) or world \* Land \* Countries or country

The word אֶרֶץ can designate the whole of planet earth, or the inhabitable world or the national territory or ground.

When coupled with heavens (שַׁמֵיִם), the phrase indicates the entire created order.Genesis 12:1
