εἷς is the cardinal number ("one"). Sometimes it functions as a indefinitely pronoun ("someone" or "a certain one"). It agrees in gender, number and case with the noun it modifies. Occurs a little under 350 times in the New Testament.

Biblical Examples

Grammatical forms

Case	Masculine	Feminine	Neuter
Nominative Singular	εἷς	μία	ἕν
Genitive Singular	ἑνός	μιᾶς	ἑνός
Dative Singular	ἑνί	μιᾶ	ἑνί
Accusative Singular	ἔνα	μίαν	ἕν

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Note that there is no plural form, since it means "one."

Also note that the word is irregular, not following standard adjective endings.

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
