	The Hebrew את word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence.
	For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by בָּרָא אֱלֹהִים (בָּנִי צִדְקִיָּהוּ בְּרִבְלָה לְעֵינָיו)
