Preposition meaning “in”. τῷplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigὸ

The definite article νόμῳ δέplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigδέ

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δέ is a conjunction that can mean “but” or “and” or “also” or “moreover”. It is a word that is used very frequently in the New Testament, and is often unexpressed and not translated in English.

The definite article ὑμετέρῳ γεγραμμένον ἐστὶνplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigεἰμί

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εἰμί is the first person singular verb for “to be” (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = “to be”).

It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἰμί is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g. ὅτι δύο ἀνθρώπων ἦplugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigὸ
