λόγος in Greek Thought

Before the New Testament, $\lambda \acute{o}\gamma o \varsigma$ already had deep philosophical use. In Greek philosophy, $\lambda \acute{o}\gamma o \varsigma$ was the rational principle that ordered the universe, the divine reason that structured all things. It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example $\epsilon l\mu l$ is the word for am and l v is the word for was, e.g.
