For example, in Genesis 1:1 the word is preceded by בְּרֵא אֱלֹהֵים (דִּבְרֵי יְהוֶה plugin-autotooltip_default plugin-autotooltip_bign;

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Meaning

* Yahweh - God's personal name

It is not a generic term for "god", but rather the word יְהוָּה (YHWH) is the name by which God uniquely identifies himself in the Old Testament.
