It only ever occurs in conjunction with nouns associated with the definite article בָּ, Genesis 1:1 אַבְיצָפון default plugin-autotooltip bigy.

The word אָרֵץ can designate the whole of planet earth, or the inhabitable world or the national territory or ground.

lt is not a generic term for "god", but rather the word יְהֹוָה (YHWH) is the name by which God uniquely identifies himself in the Old Testament.

εἰμί is the first person singular verb for "to be" (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = "to be").

It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἰμί is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g. οὒςρlugin-autotooltip default plugin-autotooltip bigὄς, ἤ, ὄ

The relative pronoun that connects a relative clause to a main clause, referring back to a noun or pronoun (called the antecedent).

lt is distinct from ὅτι ("that," introducing indirect speech) and from ὅς as an interrogative in older Greek (meaning ἐξήγαγον ἐκ γῆςplugin-autotooltip\_\_default plugin-autotooltip\_bigyῆ

Feminine noun. Connected to the English words "ground", "geometry" and "geology".
