	Τί δέ greek δέ is a conjunction that can mean “but” or “and” or “also” or “moreover”. It is a word that is used very frequently in the New Testament, and is often unexpressed and not translated in English. καὶ greek
Greek	Meaning * And * Also * Both * Even * Too * So Is a conjunction that connects single words or terms or sentences. IT is most frequently translated as “and” ἀφ’ ἑαυτῶν οὐ κρίνετε τὸ greek The definite article δίκαιον;
ESV	“And why do you not judge for yourselves what is right?”
NIV	“Why don't you judge for yourselves what is right?”
NLT	“Why can't you decide for yourselves what is right?”
KJV	Yea, and why even of yourselves judge ye not what is right?

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
