	εἶμι is the first person singular verb for “to be” (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = “to be”).	
	It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἶμι is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g.	
	ESV	And no one after drinking old wine desires new, for he says, 'The old is good.'"
	NIV	And no one after drinking old wine wants the new, for he says, 'The old is better.'"
	NLT	But no one who drinks the old wine seems to want the new wine. 'The old is just fine,' they say."
	KJV	No man also having drunk old wine straightway desireth new: for he saith, The old is better.

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
