εἰμί is the first person singular verb for "to be" (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = "to be").

It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example  $\epsilon i \mu i$  is the word for am and  $\tilde{\eta} \nu$  is the word for was, e.g.  $\pi \acute{\alpha} \nu \tau \omega \nu$  plugin-autotooltip\_default plugin-autotooltip\_big $\pi \tilde{\alpha} \varsigma$

Usage in the New Testament
