In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence. It only ever occurs in conjunction with nouns associated with the definite article הַ.Genesis 1:1 אֶתְהוּ נֶאֱמָר הַיָּמִים
ESV	The godly has perished from the earth, and there is no one upright among mankind; they all lie in wait for blood, and each hunts the other with a net.
NIV	The godly have been swept from the land; not one upright man remains. All men lie in wait to shed blood; each hunts his brother with a net.
NLT	The godly people have all disappeared; not one honest person is left on the earth. They are all murderers, setting traps even for their own brothers.

Usage in the New Testament The sense of πᾶς depends on whether it modifies a singular or plural noun, and whether that noun is countable or uncountable.
