This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence. * It is used in the creation narrative of Genesis 1, represented by the English words Genesis 1:3Exodus 3:12Ruth 1:1Isaiah 2:2 אָחַד plugin-autotooltip__default plugin-autotooltip_bigאָחַד hebrew The Hebrew אָחַד word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence. The word is dual in form (ending in -ים) which normally indicates two things (like eyes and hands), however, however it functions as a plural. Deuteronomy 10:14 states that Genesis 1:20Psalm 115:3
ESV	As soon as I heard these words I sat down and wept and mourned for days, and I continued fasting and praying before the God of heaven.
NIV	When I heard these things, I sat down and wept. For some days I mourned and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven.
NLT	When I heard this, I sat down and wept. In fact, for days I mourned, fasted, and prayed to the God of heaven.

It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense.
