The Hebrew **את** word does not have a corresponding word in English. In Hebrew, it is a marker of the accusative, i.e. the word following it is the object of the sentence. It only ever occurs in conjunction with nouns associated with the definite article **ה**. Genesis 1:1 **אֱלֹהֵי** לָהֶם **וְאֹמֵר** plugin-

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Meanings:

* Heaven or heavens * Sky * Compass

Masculine noun. The word is dual in form (ending in **-ים**) which normally indicates two things (like eyes and hands), however, however it functions as a plural.
