This is the foundational verb of existence, identity, becoming and occurrence. * It is used in the creation narrative of Genesis 1, represented by the English words Genesis 1:3Exodus 3:12Ruth 1:1Isaiah 2:2 בְּמַעֲרַה תִּפְלָה
ESV	A MASKIL OF DAVID, WHEN HE WAS IN THE CAVE. A PRAYER. With my voice I cry out to the LORD; with my voice I plead for mercy to the LORD.
NIV	I cry aloud to the LORD; I lift up my voice to the LORD for mercy.
NLT	I cry out to the LORD; I plead for the LORD's mercy.

LXX	συνέσεως τῷ greek The definite article Δαυιδ ἐν greek Preposition meaning “in”. τῷ greek The definite article εἶναι greek εἶμί is the first person singular verb for “to be” (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = “to be”). It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἶμί is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g. αὐτὸν greek Meaning * He, she, it * Himself, herself, itself * Same Personal pronoun (reflexive). Occurs more than 5,000 times in the New Testament. Core uses Function English Equivalent Typical Translation Example (Greek) Example (English) ἐν greek Preposition meaning “in”. τῷ greek The definite article σπηλαίῳ προσευχή
