	δέ is a conjunction that can mean “but” or “and” or “also” or “moreover”. It is a word that is used very frequently in the New Testament, and is often unexpressed and not translated in English. ἀκοῇ διὰ
	greek
	Meaning:
	* Through * Because * On account of
	Preposition that relates to movement through space, time, means or cause - it's a preposition of movement and mediation.
	When used with the genitive case, διὰ emphasizes the means or channel by which something happens. John 1:3 Matthew 24:12 John 1:32 Timothy 2:10 Romans 5:1 John 1:17 ῥήματος Χριστοῦ.
	Χριστοῦ.
	Christ means “anointed one”
	The equivalent Hebrew word is Messiah (מָשִׁיחַ)
	Noun, masculine.
	ESV
	So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ.
	NIV
	Consequently, faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ.
	NLT
	So faith comes from hearing, that is, hearing the Good News about Christ.
	KJV
	So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.

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
