Greek	καθὼς γέγραπται ὅτι οὐκ ἔστιν
	greek
	εἰμί is the first person singular verb for “to be” (εἶναι [the infinitive form] = “to be”).
	It an irregular verb, and, like English, changes significantly between person and tense. For example εἰμί is the word for am and ἦν is the word for was, e.g. δίκαιος οὐδέ
	greek
	Meaning
	* Not * Nor * Neither * Not even
	A combination of the words οὐ (meaning no) and δέ (meaning however or but). The word οὐδέ adds another negative element to a sentence that already has one. οὐδέ can join words, phrases, or whole clauses. It often functions like English Matthew 6:20John 7:5Romans 3:10 εἷς ,
ESV	as it is written: “None is righteous, no, not one;
NIV	As it is written: “There is no one righteous, not even one;
NLT	As the Scriptures say, “No one is righteous- not even one.
KJV	As it is written, There is none righteous, no, not one:
